Market Comment

5.37 Mnkg of tea were on offer at this weeks Colombo Tea Auction 2.50 Mnkg were Low Grown Main Grades and 1.74 Mnkg were High and Mid Grown Main Grades.

Low Grows met with good demand. Select best BOP1/ OP1s were firm to lower, whilst others sold at dearer rates. OP / OPAs were firm to dearer all-round. Pekoe's decline in value, whilst Pekoe1's appreciated in value. In the Tippy Small leaf catalogues FBOP1 / FBOPs gained in value. Select best FBOPF1s held firm; below best and others were appreciated. Stylish FBOPFs gained in value, whilst others were firm. Well-made Liquoring BOPs were irregularly lower; others gained in value. Select best BOPFs held firm; best teas were firm to lower; others were dearer. In the Premium Flowery catalogues long leaf tippy were lower; below best were firm on last. Select best small leaf tippy teas were substantially lower; others held firm.

In the Ex-Estate catalogues better Western BOP and BOPFs moved up Rs. 10 to Rs. 20 and more on special inquiry; others were fully firm to Rs. 20 dearer. Nuwara Eliya BOP / BOPFs were sharply dearer. Udupussellawa BOPs gained Rs. 10 to Rs. 20. BOPFs moved up Rs. 30 to Rs. 50 and more following special inquiry. Uva BOP / BOPFs gained Rs. 10 to Rs. 20 all-round particularly the better made teas. Stylish Medium BOPs gained Rs. 20 to Rs. 30; others were dearer Rs. 10 to Rs. 20. BOPFs gained Rs. 20 on average. Better made CTC BP1s Rs. 30 to Rs. 40 dearer; others about firm. High priced CTC PF1s were firm; improved liquoring teas gained Rs. 20 to Rs.30.

Kenya -Bomet to sell tea direct to Iran, rejects auction

Bomet County is opposed to the new tea regulations proposed by Cabinet Secretary Peter Munya because they won't benefit small-scale farmers, Governor Hillary Barchok has said. The county has instead approached factory directors from the region to find an alternative. Barchok said his administration will sell tea produced at KTDA factories directly to willing buyers, bypassing the auction that is part of the new tea regulations. He spoke at Mogogosiek tea factory where he hosted Iranian ambassador Jafar Marmaki who toured the county following a deal in which the county will sell directly to Tehran. Iran is one of the leading buyers of Kenyan tea. Ambassador Marmaki said if the deal is successful, Kenya will also benefit as Iran is a corridor to other tea-buying countries such as Pakistan. Marmaki expressed confidence the deal will be realised so farmers can reap maximum benefits. He said despite Iran having been under sanctions for more than 40 years, he was optimistic Kenya will export directly, opening trade between the two countries. During the meeting attended by more than 15 directors of KTDA-managed factories in the region, the governor sought to defend the idea. And, while many have welcomed the Munya regulations noting it is a solution to the long-standing pay issues that have faced smallholder tea farmers across the country, Barchok has rejected it. He said farmers will benefit from agreements with particular buyers since brokerage, transport and warehousing fees will be abolished. Poking holes on the tea regulations, the governor claimed some individuals were out to turn tea into their own business venture and in the long run lead to farmers being impoverished hence.

"As a county we strongly oppose it... we want things that are clear and which are done in consultation with other relevant stakeholders." In the regulations, Munya is, however, recommending that all teas produced for export in the country must be sold through the auction. "The sale of private treaties commonly referred to as direct sales overseas is outlawed and any teas that are not sold during a particular auction shall be relisted for sale during the subsequent auction," read part of the regulations. At least 15 per cent of Kenyan tea undergoes direct sales at the moment with global prices relying heavily on the performance at the auction. In backing the move, the directors said direct sales help in fetching premiums which can be used in social corporate responsibilities as compared to sales at the auction. "When you sell directly you develop strong ties with that buyer and in exchanges you get a token which helps in doing community projects unlike at the auction where there is competition for quality teas by any willing buyer," said Geoffrey Koskei from Kapkoros factory. Kapkoros group of companies' board of directors' vice chairman Richard Koskei echoed the sentiments that most of the regulations are bad for the tea industry pointing out that having a company secretary is economical as compared to each factory having its own as proposed by Munya. India's H1 tea shipments take a beating

In the first half (H1) of current calendar, India's tea exports have taken a beating on all three fronts – volume, value and price – compared to the same period of 2019.

Till June, the latest period for which official data are available with the Tea Board, India's tea exports nosedived to 93.93 million kg (mkg) from 119.72 mkg during January-June 2019, marking a decline of 21.54 per cent.

Lower availability due to output reduction, Covid-induced lockdown in many countries, suspension of transport facilities, disruption in the public auctions, hesitancy among exporters to invest huge sums against uncertain shipments and disturbance in banking operations were said to be major causes for poor performance on India's tea export front.

With fewer takers, especially at higher prices, the average price dropped to ₹218.30 a kg from ₹225.37 in January-June 2019, marking a loss of 3.14 per cent.

As less volume was shipped at lower average price, the overall earnings from tea exports suffered significantly. In H1, the overall earnings dropped to ₹2,050.52 crore from ₹2,698.13 crore, posting a shortfall of 24 per cent.

Tea industry in both North India and South India posted a decline in tea exports on all the three parameters.

"Producers, however, found the domestic market price more attractive than the export price," a trader said. (Source: The Hindu).

Kenya - Farmers threaten to boycott tea picking

Tea farmers from the Mt Kenya region are putting pressure on Kenya Tea Development Agency chairman Peter Kanyago to quit following a *Nation* expose that he was also doubling as a broker.

They have also threatened to boycott harvesting tea until the National Assembly passes the sector reforms proposed by Agriculture minister Peter Munya.

While a Tea Bill is awaiting approval, a Parliamentary Committee on Delegated Legislation which has been holding meetings with farmers in Mt Kenya region, was told that factory directors had illegally handed over their governance mandate to KTDA against management principles.

"In law, we have a *dictum delegatus non potest delegare* which means that delegated authority cannot be delegated further. A delegatee cannot delegate without our permission. They could only delegate management, not governance," said Mr Moffat Kamau during a meeting with MPs at Nduti Tea Factory in Murang'a County. (Source: Nation).

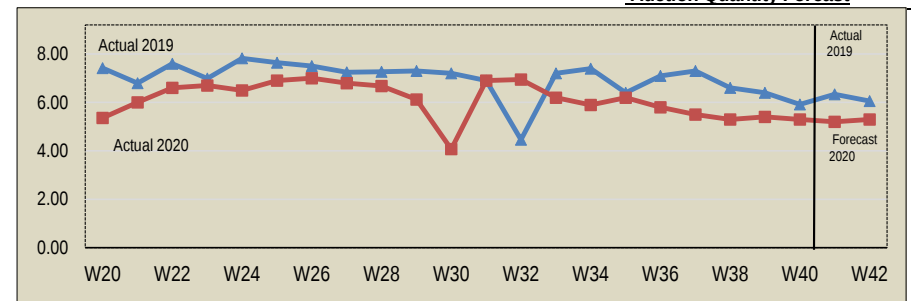

MOMBASA MARKET REPORT: SALE NO 38 – 21ST, 22ND & 23RD SEPTEMBER, 2020

There was fair general demand for the 141,097 packages (9,731,027.00 kilos) in the market and 19.24% were unsold.

LEAF GRADES - Offerings: 71,820 packages (4,675,564.00 kilos). 24.23% were unsold. Best BP1s available shed USC9 to USC10 with brighter varieties discounted by USC3 to USC40 and substantially more following quality and some invoices remained without bids while medium types were irregular varying between USC6 to USC10 dearer to easier by USC14 to USC22. Lower medium categories held firm to USC2 above previous levels to easier by up to USC3 with a few lines unsold while plainer descriptions were steady to USC16 dearer but many invoices were neglected.

The best PF1s on offer were irregular and ranged between firm to USC16 dearer to easier by up to USC20 while brighter categories saw less interest easing by USC20 to USC32 with medium types a weak feature and were discounted by USC2 to USC14 where sold. Lower medium varieties were USC2 to USC8 easier and a few invoices remained without bids while plainer descriptions held steady to USC2 below last prices with some teas neglected.

DUST GRADES -Offerings: 49,800 packages (3,664,873.00 kilos) and 13.17% remained without bids.

Best PDUSTs available eased by USC3 to USC4 while brighter varieties shed USC2 to USC21 where sold with medium types irregular ranging between USC6 to USC21 above previous week's prices to easier by USC5 to USC9. Lower medium categories varied between steady to USC10 dearer to easier by up to USC7 with a few lines unsold while plainer sorts were irregular varying between firm to USC4 above last rates to easier by up to USC8 with some invoices remaining without bids.

The best DUST1s on offer eased by USC9 to USC18 with brighter sorts easing by USC7 to USC17 and a few invoices were unsold. Medium types were discounted by USC12 to USC40 where sold while lower medium varieties were steady to USC13 above last levels. Plainer descriptions held firm to USC8 easier and some invoices were neglected.

SECONDARY GRADES -Offerings: 19,477 packages (980,590.00 kilos) with 16.35% unsold.

In the Secondary Catalogues, BPs were firm with PFs steady. Clean well sorted coloury Fannings eased while similar DUSTs held value. Other Fannings were firm with DUSTs steady. BMFs were well absorbed at previous rates.

MARKETS

Egyptian Packers lent more and useful support with useful interest from Pakistan Packers while UK were active but at lower rates. There was good but selective activity from Sudan with reduced support from Yemen, other Middle Eastern countries, Kazakhstan, other CIS nations, Afghanistan, Bazaar and Russia. Iran were subdued with less interest from Local Packers. Somalia were active at the lower end of the market.
